

Study Grants for Indigenous Dental Students

Eligibility

The Study Grants will be available to dental students:

- Who are of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (Indigenous) descent/identify as Indigenous and are accepted as such by that community in which they live;
- Who are enrolled full-time in an Australian undergraduate or graduate entry dental degree immediately leading to registration as a dentist and must have completed at least the first year of that degree; and
- **Note** that Study Grants are **not** applicable to those students who are enrolled in degree courses to qualify as a dental hygienist, dental therapist, oral health therapist, and/or dental prosthetists.

This completed application form must have attached to it:

- A signed Statutory Declaration declaring:
 - » The applicant is of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (Indigenous) background; and

» Responses to the seven questions listed on page 2 & 3.

Note that the template provided with this form has been provided to assist in this process however applicants are responsible for ensuring that the Statutory Declaration template is the most current and valid;

» Responses to questions 3-7 should be kept to a maximum of 250 words per question.

- Evidence of enrolment in full-time study for the current and previous calendar year.
- Additional supporting evidence may be included to support applicants' responses to the application questions. Some examples of credible evidence include but is not limited to:
 - » Evidence of past contribution to Indigenous community.
 - » Evidence of future planning to contribute to Indigenous community.
 - » Receipts for rent, board, utilities etc.

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Note 1 A person who intentionally makes a false statement in a statutory declaration is guilty of an offence, the punishment for which is imprisonment for a term of 4 years — see section 11 of the *Statutory Declarations Act 1959*.

Note 2 Chapter 2 of the Criminal Code applies to all offences against the *Statutory Declarations Act 1959* — see section 5A of the *Statutory Declarations Act 1959*.

A statutory declaration under the *Statutory Declarations Act 1959* may be made before—

1. a person who is currently licensed or registered under a law to practise in one of the following occupations:

 - Australian Consular Officer or Australian Diplomatic Officer (within the meaning of the *Consular Fees Act 1955*)
 - Bailiff
 - Bank officer with 5 or more continuous years of service
 - Building society officer with 5 or more years of continuous service
 - Chief executive officer of a Commonwealth court
 - Clerk of a court
 - Commissioner for Affidavits
 - Commissioner for Declarations
 - Credit union officer with 5 or more years of continuous service
 - Employee of the Australian Trade Commission who is:
 - (a) in a country or place outside Australia; and
 - (b) authorised under paragraph 3 (d) of the *Consular Fees Act 1955*; and
 - (c) exercising his or her function in that place
 - Employee of the Commonwealth who is:
 - (a) in a country or place outside Australia; and
 - (b) authorised under paragraph 3 (c) of the *Consular Fees Act 1955*; and
 - (c) exercising his or her function in that place
 - Fellow of the National Tax Accountants' Association
 - Finance company officer with 5 or more years of continuous service
 - Holder of a statutory office not specified in another item in this list
 - Judge of a court
 - Justice of the Peace
 - Magistrate
 - Marriage celebrant registered under Subdivision C of Division 1 of Part IV of the *Marriage Act 1961*
 - Master of a court

- Member of Chartered Secretaries Australia
- Member of Engineers Australia, other than at the grade of student
- Member of the Association of Taxation and Management Accountants
- Member of the Australasian Institute of Mining and Metallurgy
- Member of the Australian Defence Force who is:
 - (a) an officer; or
 - (b) a non-commissioned officer within the meaning of the *Defence Force Discipline Act 1982* with 5 or more years of continuous service; or
 - (c) a warrant officer within the meaning of that Act
- Member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in Australia, the Australian Society of Certified Practising Accountants or the National Institute of Accountants
- Member of:
 - (a) the Parliament of the Commonwealth; or
 - (b) the Parliament of a State; or
 - (c) a Territory legislature; or
 - (d) a local government authority of a State or Territory
- Minister of religion registered under Subdivision A of Division 1 of Part IV of the *Marriage Act 1961*
- Notary public
- Permanent employee of the Australian Postal Corporation with 5 or more years of continuous service who is employed in an office supplying postal services to the public
- Permanent employee of:
 - (a) the Commonwealth or a Commonwealth authority; or
 - (b) a State or Territory or a State or Territory authority; or
 - (c) a local government authority;with 5 or more years of continuous service who is not specified in another item in this list
- Person before whom a statutory declaration may be made under the law of the State or Territory in which the declaration is made

Study Grants for Indigenous Dental Students – Terms and Conditions

The Australian Dental Association (ADA) welcomes applications for the ADA Study Grants for Indigenous Dental Students.

About the Study Grants for Dental Students

The ADA recognises that Australians from Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander (Indigenous) backgrounds face additional challenges that are a legacy of Australia's past history.

The ADA's Study Grants for Indigenous Dental Students aims to support those Australians who identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander (Indigenous Australians). It is targeted to those students who are enrolled as full-time students in an Australian dental degree that would qualify the student to practice as a dentist and have completed at least the first year of that degree.

Each year the ADA will issue up to five Study Grants for Indigenous Dental Students each year. Each Study Grant is valued at \$5,000.

Eligibility

The Study Grants will be available to dental students:

- i) Who are Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander (Indigenous) descent / identify as Indigenous and are accepted as such by that community in which they live;
- ii) Who are enrolled full-time in an Australian undergraduate or graduate entry dental degree immediately leading to registration as a dentist and have completed at least the first year of that degree; and
- iii) **Note** that Study Grants are not applicable to those students who are enrolled in degree courses to qualify as a dental hygienist, dental therapist, oral health therapist, and/or dental prosthetists.

Guidelines

1. Applications must be submitted via the appropriate form available from the ADA (www.ada.org.au/grants) or from the relevant faculty office. This application form will also require a statutory declaration from the applicant which includes responses to the questions listed in the application form (a maximum of 250-word response per question).
2. A judging panel will assess applications based on the judging criteria set out below and ranked based on their final score, from highest to lowest. The five scoring applicants will be awarded a grant and will be notified by the ADA by email to the email address provided in the application.
3. The judging panel will be a sub-committee of the ADA Dental Education and Training Committee (DETC) and will consist of two members of the DETC, and one Indigenous Dentist nominated by the Indigenous Dentists Association Australia.

Judging criteria

Applications will be judged based on the answers to the questions identified on the application form and assessed against the rubric below.

Where there are remaining Study Grants to be allocated and there is a tie between ranked applications, the tied applications will be re-scored by the judging panel.

Judging decisions are final, and no correspondence will be entered into.

Timeframes

Applications for the Study Grants open in January of each year and close by 31 March of that year.

Applicants that are awarded a Study Grant will be contacted following the conclusion of the judging process.
